

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Introduction

Background to this syllabus

- The Speech and Drama syllabus is the most longstanding within the Speech syllabus package.
- It is designed for individual students who wish to undertake practical speech and drama training, accompanied by equivalent theoretical studies.
- Of all the Speech syllabi, this one takes the most academic approach.
- It offers students the opportunity to achieve high level qualifications such as the Licentiate and Fellowship Diplomas.
- This syllabus is recommended for those who wish to qualify as a Speech teacher.

- The examiner will select a passage from *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* for the candidate to read aloud.

OR

- Prepared.
- Approximately 200 consecutive words from The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe.

Grade 6 Theory examination

Examination duration: 3 hours. Pass mark: 70

Notes for Teachers

- Grade 6 consists of theory and practical examinations, both of which must be passed to receive the Grade 6 certificate.
- An increased literary standard is required for this and later examinations.
- Candidates are asked to avoid grammatical errors, poor spelling, the use of clichés and slang.

There will be questions chosen from the following areas

- All theory of previous grades.
- Breathing
 - o Correct and incorrect breathing methods.
 - o Advantages of the correct and disadvantages of the incorrect breathing methods.
 - o Drawings may be used but are not essential.
- Articulation and pronunciation
 - o Qualities of correct pronunciation.
 - o Common faults in articulation and pronunciation.
 - o General points for good articulation.
 - o Strong and weak form words and examples of these.
- Vowels and consonants
 - o Detailed classification of vowels and consonants.
 - o Drawing of a labelled mouth chart showing the position of the various monophthongs and diphthongs using phonetic symbols.
- Phonetic transcription of a brief passage—Broad or Narrow form to be stated by the candidate.
- Points for the performance of mime.
- To be able to write a short story on a given theme or opening sentence.
- Knowledge and understanding of the literature used for the various selections in the practical examination.

- Sentence structure should precise.
- Answers should include greater detail than for previous grades.

There will be questions chosen from the following areas

- Physiology of breathing including diagrams.
- Audibility.
- Voice.
- Clarity of speech sounds and common faults.
- Relaxation.
- Phonetic transcription of a passage—Broad or Narrow form to be stated by the candidate.
- The spread of the English language worldwide.
- The book, verse and drama chosen for the Grade 7 practical examination
 - o Characters
 - o Themes
 - o Settings
 - o Climaxes
 - o Purpose
 - o Language
 - o Style

The Performance Certificate (Stage 8) examination from the Speech and Drama Performance syllabus is considered equivalent to this Proficiency Practical examination. The successful completion of either the Performance Certificate (Speech and Drama Performance) or Proficiency Certificate Practical (Speech and Drama) together with the successful completion of the Proficiency Theory examination satisfies the requirements for the Proficiency Certificate.

Examination duration: 3 hours. Pass mark: 70

Notes for Teachers

- Proficiency Certificate consists of theory and practical examinations, both of which must be passed to receive the Proficiency Certificate.
- In this paper a more advanced knowledge of all aspects of the theory is expected.

There will be questions chosen from the following areas

- All theory of previous grades.
- The technique of breath conservation and the importance of good breathing in performance.
- Vocal production, modulation, tone.
- Physiology: chest, lungs, larynx, head, speech organs, breathing muscles.
- Phonetic transcription of a passage—Broad or Narrow form to be stated by the candidate.
- The application of emphasis, tune and timing.
- Rhyme, poetic devices, metre, poetic style, construction of verse, verse classification.
- All relevant authors studied and the literary periods in which they were writing.
- Shakespearian theatre; staging Shakespeare.
- A deeper understanding of the content of the novel, the dramas and the poetry selected for the practical examination.
- Literary style: fiction, non-fiction, grammar and punctuation.
- Solecisms, ambiguity, redundancy, vogue words, tautology, clichés, colloquialisms, irony.

The programme must be chosen to give the candidate the opportunity to show versatility in presentations of prose, poetry, drama, public speaking, reading, impromptu work and creativity in interpretation. The examiners will discuss the programme with the candidate throughout the examination.
