As you exhale: "I am safe." These simple affirmations are more than words, they become anchors that help you regulate emotions, settle the noise, and return to yourself.

This practice prepares you for the deeper emotional work ahead. In your everyday life, this connection to breath becomes a refuge. It supports you when stress rises, grounds you when you feel scattered, and reminds you of the strength and wisdom within.

Let your breath guide you, gently, steadily, back to your heart. Back to you.

Sadly, Associate Professor Jordan Murray is leaving AGE at the end of August 2025.



Since joining the *Australian Guild of Education* (formerly the Australian Guild of Music Education) in <u>January 2022</u>, Jordan has contributed significantly to curriculum development and academic leadership.

Initially appointed to review and refine the Pianoforte Examination Syllabi, his role quickly expanded to include online teaching units in *Technology and Composition*, *Musicology*, *Pedagogy*, and *Musicianship*, with responsibilities for continuous review and enhancement of these units.

Following the Guild's transition to face-to-face delivery, Jordan was promoted to Academic Director, where he oversaw the development and implementation of six Professional Skills units, shaping the program to meet the evolving needs of music students and the wider industry.

There is so much chatter about governance – 'good governance' specifically. A great deal of emphasis is put on the somewhat superficial format of reports and documents – sometimes the emphasis is somewhat childish. Governance is not about the look and feel, it is about the relationship between elements of the business and the supportive nature of that interface.

My observation is that one of the negative elements of governance is 'staying too long' in the job. A three-year stint in key governance roles (chairs, committee leads, memberships and the like) is probably ideal. Anything beyond that point usually leads to tensions and losing sight of the actual role specifics – providing support to the business personnel and mechanisms.

Ideal duration of governance roles - three years - and move on.

Australia operates its Australian Qualifications Framework levels as a way of standardising qualifications across the Australian education and training system.

The policy framework of the AQF provides the structures required for Australian qualifications. Ostensibly, the aim is to warrant that qualifications are consistent and equivalent across the various education and training sectors (higher education, vocational education and training, and schools).

The AQF - in regard to degree level qualification - leaves large gaps in ensuring that qualifications are standardized meaningfully in their true equivalence.





We are actively involved in *benchmarking at three levels* – including a smaller project (Level 1) with AMPA and KIHE – two meetings have been held to date exploring key issues including the *terms of engagement*, *re-registration/re-accreditation timelines* and *marketing to domestic students*.

Intended foci further includes – documentation, resourcing, IT management, academic integrity, data collection and sharing, scholarship

A second robust benchmarking activity (Level 2) involves a larger consortium (we were invited to join in June 2025) including PIA, SISTC, SIHE, UBSS, SMC, EIA and AAHE. We have attended two of these meetings. The key issues/foci include *grade distribution*, *EFTSL*, *attrition*, *overall passes*, *academic integrity breaches* and *moderation*.



Tom is our representative – the group meets monthly.

Both projects are sector 'typical' and we are in the right space.



Unique to the Sector, though, is our involvement in an international project (*commencing October 2025*) putting AGE on the international stage (Level 3). AGE is being inducted into the Musicum20 international consortium (and think tank) providing both national and international benchmarking and co-operative activities. Members include institutions from Australia, Japan, France, South Korea, Hong Kong, Germany, Singapore, Thailand, UK and China.

The initiative was established in 2013 with representatives from Japan, France, Australia, Korea and Hong Kong. It has expanded over the years and now includes an eJournal, books, blogs, podcasts and masters' level research papers – as well as an annual international symposium.

The key *benchmarking* foci include – grade distribution, scholarship, moderation and internationalisation.






Unquestionably, it clearly does have huge potential to negatively impact both academic integrity and revenue.



"Welcome to Part Six of this meditation journey - Dance. In this practice, we invite the body to become an expression of the heart. Dance is one of the oldest and purest forms of meditation. It is movement without judgement, rhythm without rules, and freedom without boundaries. As you listen, allow yourself to release the weight of expectations. You do not need to know the steps. You do not need to look a certain way. All that matters is presence.

With each beat of the music, feel the energy flowing through you. With each breath, notice how your body longs to sway, to stretch, to move in harmony with life itself. This is not performance, it is permission. Permission to let go, to embody joy, to rediscover the rhythm that has always been within you. So, as we begin, I invite you to trust your body, trust your heart, and let your dance become a prayer, a meditation, and a celebration of your aliveness."



The working from home (WFH) debate and proposed legislation


